




Josef Haydn and Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, the old master and the young prodigy, delighted their listeners in the late 18th century and continue to do so over 200 years later. Haydn's late Creation Mass is so called because he quoted music from Adam and Eve's duet in the Gloria, thereby scandalising the Empress Maria Theresa. Mozart's Solemn Vespers K339, soloists from the RNCM, and orchestra all contribute to an uplifting evening.

The text of the Requiem Mass has inspired many composers. The Festival Choir has performed settings by Biber, M Haydn, Mozart, Berlioz, Verdi, Fauré and John Rutter.



And it's the second time we'll have performed this profoundly beautiful work by Maurice Duruflé. Based on plainchant but with sumptuous harmonies, drama and consolation are perfectly balanced. The concert includes shorter choral items and solos from choir members and our organist **Andrew Dean**.

Founded by Dr John Coope MBE in 1964, and conducted since 2002 by Donald Judge, Bollington Festival Choir is a friendly Choir that retains its village roots while attracting members from a wide area. The Choir has always performed some unusual repertoire which is seldom tackled by other choirs: this year, we hope you'll enjoy a rarely performed oratorio by the young Saint-Saëns, a less familiar but glorious setting of the *Requiem* by his countryman Duruflé, and a world première by Donald Judge.
